AHA manages more than 50 national projects that fall under the following four service streams:

- Emergency Preparedness and Response Services: Enhances Australia's capability to detect and respond to emergency animal diseases and supports Australia's market access.
- **Biosecurity and Product Integrity Services**: Strengthens awareness of the value and need for on-farm biosecurity practices and provides tools for the tracing and assessment of risk with the movement of livestock.
- **Corporate Services**: Supports AHA's staff to deliver projects through financial technology, information technology and human capital frameworks.
- **Communications and Training Services**: Delivers tailored communications and training activities which support AHA's strategic priorities to members and stakeholders and, where needed, on their behalf.

#### Key projects include:

- Safeguarding the Emergency Animal Disease Response Agreement (EADRA).
- Managing the Australian Veterinary Emergency Plan (AUSVETPLAN).
- Coordinating and delivering emergency animal disease training.
- Contributing to the awareness of robust on-farm biosecurity practice.
- Directing a number of surveillance, traceability and welfare projects.
- A biosecurity and policy hub, with a range of meeting facilities available for hire.
